A total hip replacement means replacing the head of the femur and the socket with a special steel ball and plastic cup, and cementing these components with methyl methacrylate. The procedure was developed by John Charnley of Wrightington, England.

The Hipps were visiting relatives in Sylacauga, Alabama, when they were involved in the accident. Mrs. Hipp, who uses a walker since the accident, has been invited by her husband to have Christmas dinner in the hospital with him.

As his picture was being taken, Mr. Hipp was asked what he wanted for Christmas. "Cheese," replied Mr. Hipp, smiling broadly. Afterwards he

confessed, however, that what he would really like would be to go home.

According to hospital officials, Mr. Hipp's condition is satisfactory and he's working every day with the help of the physical therapist. It may not be by Christmas, but hopefully before long the retired farmer may be back in Randolph.

I have two different reports that come from folks working on the Yancey family. One was from my cousin who was a Senator of Mississippi and he said we or the Original brother was Lewis Davis, then Thelma Sargent said we were from Charles. I plan to have a lady see if she can find out just which one we came from but I will send you all the information that I have on either. Since you mentioned Thelma Sargent, then I think you have the material that she put out.

I have worked for years on thés and as you know it is a disease and very expensive but I keep telling folks that there are no pockets in that casket when you leave here and this is my hobby even if it is expensive, where they spend on something else I spend on Genealogy. For years, foresters in Calhoun County have preached that Loblolly pine managed correctly can make profitable returns for the farmer. Proper thinning will eliminate poor quality, slow growing trees, concentrate growth on the high quality trees remaining, and provide a frequent income for the owner.

Dwight M. Hipp of Sarepta is one of many landowners in Calhoun who has proven that properly thinned pine plantations are a good investment.



Mr. Hipp planted 9 acres to loblolly pine in 1948. At age 11, he made a light thinning to increase the growth of his still small trees. He received \$100 for the pulpwood. In 1962 at age 14, Forest Service personnel marked 25 units that sold for \$150. In 1965, Mr. Hipp sold 67 units for \$400. This month, he is making a harvest cut on the 20 year old plantation. He is selling about 100 units of pulpwood for \$750. This is certainly a better than average income from a pine plantation. Mr. Hipp, in 20 years,

cut about 215 units of pulpwood (approximately 29 cords per acre) and received \$1,400. He actually made about \$7.75 per acre per year from his plantation.

Mr. Hipp is very happy with his tree farm operation and will replant the area this winter. If you have plantations that need thinning, contact the Forest Service or Mississippi Forestry Commission for assistance.

Her trips reminded me of the little boy in the funny paper in All our family. His trips are about like hers use to be.

During Ray's high school days Dick got him a pool table. I had wanted a den so bad but no Dick said it was going to be a pool room which it was. Ray's friends would come by and want to paly even when Ray was not here. They would stay back there for hours playing, never did hear anything out of them, they were all good kids.

YANCEY FAMILY

late 1600's or early 1700's the family, Welsh and Irish stock, settled in colonial Virginia. The Quit Rent

Roll of King William County for 1704 shows Charles Yancey. Of this family, the sons were to disperse South. William Yancey settled in Wilkes County, Georgia; and, according to the Revolutionary Records of that state, he owned 200 acres in 1784. Of this branch of the family, William Lowndes Yancey was to become "The Voice of Secession" in the South prior to the War Between the States.

When he was still a young man, Louis B. Yancey (Aug. 3, 1816-Oct. 7, 1903) left Virginia, and came to Tippah County, Mississippi. It is not known whether he married Mary Jane— (Nov. 15, 1825-Oct. 6, 1899) before or after moving into this area. Their children were: Charles Franklin (Jan. 24, 1862-Mar. 25, 1955), Ike V. (Apr. 23, 1857-July 13, 1921), Pink L., Bob, John Sam, Addie, and Green Leaf (Oct. 9, 1845-June 8, 1922). Of these sons two served in the Confederate Army. John was in Co. B. of the 7th Mississippi Cavalry and Green, still a teenager, served under General Albert Sidney Johnston. When Ripley was occupied by Federal forces, some of the troops camped at Louis' farm which was east of Ripley. The War's end found Green at Mobile, Alabama, and he walked the entire distance home.

Green married and had a son, Sam. After his wife's death, he remarried and a daughter, Jennie Mae (Cook) was born. His second wife died, too, and he was left with two children to raise. His last marriage was to Josephine Wells Miller (Sept. 24, 1860-Nov. 19, 1946), the daughter of William P. and Malinda S. Wilson Miller (March 19, 1839-Aug. 28, 1898). Miller's birth and death dates are unknown as the stone in Carolina Methodist Cemetery reads: Sgt. W. P. Miller Co E 32 1st Infantry CSA. Green's and Josephine's children were: Elmer (married Gertrude Anderson), Clara (Stark), Nora (Stark), Verge (Crum), Patti Etta (Bartlett), Leola who died at 18 probably of appendicitis, and William Edward (Sept. 3, 1884-Dec. 9, 1970).

The Adairs were a pioneer family in Union County, Mississippi. They had immigrated to this country from Belfast, Ireland in the 1700's. Robert N. Adair (June 29, 1829-March 27, 1907) married Elizabeth Kennedy. Their son, who is in this direct line, was Brice Holloway Adair (Nov. 12, 1846-June 7, 1892). In 1865, he married the daughter of Milton A. (Jan. 7, 1804-March 28, 1876) and Elizabeth (March 28, 1827-July 29, 1881) Bullock. She was Nancy Ann Bullock (March 12, 1847-Aug. 2, 1933). An active member of her community, she was a charter member of Mt. Zion

Methodist Church and served the local ladies faithfully as a midwife. Brice and Nancy lived in a one-room log cabin. In this one-room house seven children were born: Deck, Luther, Walter, Baxter (June 20, 1883-Oct. 14, 1900), Lottie (Horton), Ada (Davis), and Verna Myrtle (Dec. 20, 1889).

Oxen were kept for logging and other work, and Baxter was killed in an accident when he was pinned against a tree by an ox.

In this community, as in others in the South, there was a band of ruffians who called themselves Ku Klux Klan. Luther had been seeing a girl and the Klan decided to put an end to this affair. They arrived at the Adair home on the night of June 7, 1892. Armed with shotguns, they demanded to see Luther. They shot into the house, killing Brice Adair. Luther returned the fire, killing one of the Klan. The family erected a large stone on Brice's grave in Mt. Zion Cemetery. The Klan, angered by the following inscription, desecrated it:

B. H. Adair lost his life
on the 7th night of June,
While standing by his wife
trying to save his son.

Mr. Adair lived a Christian life,
This his neighbors all know.
While his son he was trying to rescue
he received the fatal blow.

? Twelve white caps at midnight
Price Chisolm one of the crew,
And with a double barrel shotgun
the awful deed did do.

Later, Nancy and her children moved to Dumas. On Nov. 24, 1912, the Adair and Yancey families were joined. With L. E. Horton, Sr. and Gertrude Anderson as witnesses, Verna Adair and William Edward (Edd) Yancey, were married by Rev. J. D. Boggs, the pastor of Payne's Chapel Methodist Church. They settled in the Mitchell Community, east of Ripley. Their home was typical of the rural houses of its day. A large, unpainted frame house, it had a dogrun down the middle and a porch the length of the front. A cellar was dug out under the kitchen for storing potatoes and canned fruits and vegetables. There was also

a large smokehouse, small cottage, storehouse, barn and sheds on the farm. A large branch ran through the rich bottom land, where corn, cotton and other crops were raised. There were cows and chickens; and hogs, whose meat would be cured and whose fat was used to make lard and soap. The farm was almost self-sufficient; but when the time came to go to town, Edd would hitch horses or mules to his wagon and drive to Ripley on what is now Highway 4 East. In winter he would put a quilt across his lap and set a coal-oil lantern by his feet to keep them warm.

On Sept. 21, 1913 a son was born. He was named Fred Miller Yancey. He died Nov. 4, 1915; and in less than a week, Nov. 9, 1915, Verna gave birth to another son, Walter Randolph. Ruby Lucille was born Oct. 18, 1918, and on Jan. 6, 1921, Malcolm Roy. Loyd Wilson was born Feb. 16, 1924, but died June 11, 1925. William Edward, Jr. (W. E.) was born May 12, 1926. On Aug. 12, 1930, twin daughters, Doris Eugenia and Dorothy Lois, were born. They were

followed by Bobby Adair who was born June 22, 1933. Note that family names—Wilson, Miller, and Adair—were used for middle names, showing a pride in family heritage.

Raising a family during the Great Depression wasn't easy, but they fared better than many of their neighbors who lost their farms during this period. The children attended community grammar schools at Chapman and Mitchell and later high school at Pine Grove. In the summer months and in the afternoons after school the children helped in the fields. When Verna wanted to call the workers from the field to eat, she would blow into the end of a large conch shell. Its trumpeting sound could be heard far down into the valley.

Randolph went to work in a Civilian Conservation Corps camp in Tishomingo County as a radio (Morse) operator. He was one of more than 250,000 youths at work under army officers clearing forests, planting trees, improving roads, etc. They were paid \$1 a day each in addition to medical care and maintenance, but were required to allot \$25 a month to dependents or relatives.

Randolph married Beatrice Carmichael on May 27, 1939. They lived in the Mitchell Community. They had one son, Billy Wayne, born Nov. 20, 1945. Billy Wayne married Wanda Shackelford and they have two sons, Edward Allen (Dec. 16, 1968) and David Wayne (June 1, 1973). Randolph was an accomplished carpenter who built many beautiful homes in this area before his death on June 1, 1980.

YANCEY, LEWIS BENTLY

On Sept. 14, 1940, Roy married Ernie Deas Davis. Shortly after World War II n, he was drafted and stationed at Blanding, Florida. After the war, they moved back to Tippah County, eventually living in Blue Mountain. Roy farmed and worked in local industries. He served in various capacities of law enforcement, including one term as Sheriff of Tippah County (1976-1979). They adopted two children: Gilda Sue (Oct. 28, 1954) married Henry McLellan and has two children, Tara Lyn (Feb. 9, 1975) and Matthew Ryan (Jan. 18, 1979); and Malcolm Roy, Jr. (Mike) was born Sept. 7, 1958.

Ruby married Edward H. (Joe) Nabors on April 5, 1941. Ruby has operated a beauty shop in Ripley for many years. Joe served one term as Sheriff of Tippah County (1952-1955) and has had automotive shops in Ripley. They have three children: Kathy Sharon (June 1, 1952) married Clarence Balof, Larry Joe (June 9, 1956) married Nedra Nance, and James Kerry (Sept. 9, 1959).

In a double ceremony, Dec. 3, 1949, Doris married Johnnie Faye Jumper and Dorothy married Charles Wildman. Doris and Johnnie turned a hobby, fighting gamecocks, into a profitable business venture. First in a partnership with singer Ray Price and later in a private business, their roosters have been fought and sold nationally. They have one son, Randy Neal, born April 1, 1967.

Dorothy and Charlie built a store in partnership with Mr. and Mrs. Lavaughn Akins on Highway 15 N. It was later sold and is now Zippy One-Stop. Dorothy now works at Pep Industries. They have two children: Brenda Kay (Nov. 24, 1950) married Johnny Burgess, and Eddie (June

22, 1960).

W.E., Jr. is employed at Genesco and Bobby at American Biltrite, both in Ripley.

We grandchildren remember "Gran-Ed" in his later years, sitting barefoot on the porch or in his big rocking chair by the fireplace. He dipped snuff from brown bottles and he always wore over-alls, even to church with a suit coat. He had a set of false teeth, but refused to wear them. There was a big clock on the mantle and it was never wound forward, even if the rest of the country was on Daylight Savings Time. He died Dec. 9, 1970 of leukemia. We remember Grandma, too. She would let us help gather eggs or get water, cautioning us not to get too close to the crank as she lowered the bucket into the well. She baked apple pies and kept old-fashioned pot flowers, like geraniums and ferns, on the porch. On her birthday she was honored with a large party at Payne's Chapel Methodist Church. It was attended by many of the friends in her community who had come to love and respect her just as we do.

Hicks, Mowry, Burke, *A History of American Democracy* (Boston, 1970), p. 672.

Quoting from an article in the *Southern Sentinel*, Oct. 10, 1903, written by Rev. W. E. Berry of Blue Mountain, Mississippi; "Lewis Bently Yancey was born in Hancock County, Virginia on 3 Aug. 1816. He was married to Harriett Hobson of North Carolina, and moved to Mississippi in 1850, in what is now Alcorn County, but moved to Tippah County in 1851. His wife died soon after the move and he was married to Mary Waldon 31 July 1856. She died 7 Oct. 1899. Lewis died 8 Oct. 1903. He was buried in Rucker Grave Yard."

Rev. W. E. Berry knew the family well, was Lewis' good friend and conducted the funeral services.

The children of Lewis and Harriett Hobson Yancey were: Green, Robert, and Samuel. The children of Lewis and Mary Waldon Yancey were: Charlie, Pink, Isaac, and Mary Adilaide (Addie).

Isaac (Ike) (4/23/1857-7/13/1921) married Jo Ann Hines (1/24/1862-5/27/1941). Their children were: Julia, who married Will Braddock; Rosia who married Worth Braddock; Pink who married Rosia Smith; William E. (Will) married Louiza Smith; Johnny married Effie Jamieson; and Lewis, Jr. married Ethel Tapp.

William Edward Yancey (4/2/1881-12/12/1963) and Louiza's children were: Isaac (deceased); Louiza (deceased); Josia Frances (b. 8/17/1905) married Lindsey Hopper; William E. (Will) was married a second time to Hermie Senora Moffitt (1 Nov. 1890-31 Oct. 1958). Their children are: Charlie (1911); Ruth (1913); Mark (1915) Mildred (1918); Herman (1921); Buford (1923); Agnes (1926); and Jasper (1930-1970).

William Edward Yancey (Will) reared his

family and lived his entire life in Tippah County. One unique thing—and one that his acquaintances remember vividly, is the fact that a stone called the "mad-stone" was in his possession for many years. Before medication was available to treat persons bitten by dogs with hydrophobia or poisonous snakes, this stone was soaked in sweet milk and bound to the wound. It was thought that when the stone had drawn the poison out, the stone would fall away. Again it was soaked in milk and placed on the wound until the stone would no longer adhere to the wound. Many people feel that they owe their lives to this stone. The stone was said to have been removed from the heart of a deer. It is seldom ever found in an animal and because it is rare, it is passed from generation to generation. Will's son, Charlie, has the stone today.

The Yancey's burial ground is, and has been since the first Yancey families came to Tippah County, the Rucker Cemetery. This Cemetery has no church near and is off any main road, but is a beautiful and peaceful place. Many Yancey and Yancey relatives are buried there. The original ground was donated by the Rucker family and later additional land was donated by Richard Mann, a grandson of Lewis Bently Yancey. Relatives and interested friends keep the grounds fenced and mowed. During the early years of its history, an annual type of homecoming was held. The women prepared food and brought to spread picnic-style while the men cleaned the "graveyard".

Kenneth E. Yancey's recollection of our Grandfather, Jasper Yancey:

I've been giving a great deal of thought to trying to get something on tape about my grandfather Yancey and at the urging of my first cousin, Marion Heilner of Baker, Oregon, I am now undertaking to put into more formal order, some of my recollections of our grandfather, Jasper Yancey.

So far as I recall, I first became acquainted with my grandfather at the age of possibly four or five years while we were living in American Fork, Utah and while grandfather and grandmother Yancey lived in a small home on the north side of the Oregon Shortline Railroad track, approximately eight blocks from where we lived. I recall that we would occasionally visit with grandmother and grandfather, I traveling beside my Mom while she was wheeling a baby carriage containing my sister, Leon. That was quite a long walk for us. Mom seemed to enjoy it and we visited with my grandparents.

My father, Albert, was, in those days, connected with the sheep-raising business and spent most of his time away from home, coming home occasionally. At that time, grandmother was severely afflicted with dropsey, I think it was called then, causing her body to swell, which seemed to me at the time to be of enormous proportions. This evidently was a characteristic of the disease--causing the arms and legs to swell way beyond normal proportions. She was immobilized and was usually sitting in a large rocking chair at the time of our visit.

Grandfather was not a large man, I would estimate approximately 5'8" and in the area of 150-160 pounds. He was handsome, I would say, and wore a beard as well as a mustache a great deal of the time. He was of a rather jovial disposition and I liked him, because he used to pat me on the head and tell me that I was a good boy. As I grew a little older, I would meet grandfather on the street uptown. It would usually happen that he would have a nickle for me for the purpose of an ice-cream cone or another confection of my choice. This happened so frequently that I am sure I took it for granted. I recall one day I met him and he didn't produce the nickle as usual. After a short exchange of amenities, I felt I should remind him that I didn't have my nickle and this is one of the things that I will always remember about him. He immediately came back at me with the reply that a young fellow my age should not approach his grandfather for a demand for money--even for an ice-cream cone. This had quite a sobering effect on me and tho our relationship continued, I always looked upon grandfather in a different light. As I grew older I learned he was indeed right and I had a greater appreciation for his counsel even tho it was of few words and directly to the point.

I don't remember the year nor how old I was when grandmother passed away, but I was of very tender years. Grandfather continued to live in the old home for a number of years, then his health seemed to deteriorate somewhat and as I recall, he spent some time residing with other of his children in different parts of the country.

Then it became evident that grandfather needed to be where he could be looked after and my father, Albert and I along with grandfather, constructed a one-room cabin or home for him on a lot that adjoined ours, which my father purchased for the purpose of providing a home for grandfather. This cabin would have been approximately 14 x 18 feet and was insulated and lined, built with tongue and groove fir flooring inside and out and was heated by a single coal-burning cook stove.

This made grandfather very comfortable and happy and he lived there alone for quite a number of years. At this time, we grew joint gardens and I learned several things from him and I think my mother enjoyed having him there, as he was a very good neighbor and gardner. Our relationships were always of the best, although at times I didn't particularly enjoy having my counselor at such close range at a time in my life when I was inclined to explore and try out a few things.

During my acquaintance, grandfather was not active in the Church, although I understood from the beginning that he and his small family had migrated to Utah for the Church. I further understand that a few early incidents after their arrival in Utah, rather soured grandfather and some of his children on the Church. I was never really acquainted with what these circumstances were.

Grandfather had a very pleasant singing voice, tho I never did hear him sing on any formal basis, he did so for his own amusement sing quite a little bit, and I rather enjoyed hearing him do this because it indicated a rather cheerful mood. I'm not aware of his being otherwise talented in any particular instrument or other activity. If grandfather had any particular vocational skill, I was not aware of it, inasmuch as he was usually employed in some construction or laboring capacity and had a reputation of being a good man on the job.

It is indeed unfortunate that we fail to recognize the great values and the good things about people and situations until after they are gone. I've often wondered what the exact circumstances of grandmother and grandfather becoming converts to the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints. I'm sure there was a great deal of persecution involved and possibly gread hardships in connection with their conversion and their traveling to Utah for the Gospel.

At the funeral of my father, a telegram was received from President George Albert Smith, expressing his regret at not being able to come to the funeral, and then he went on to say that Jasper Yancey was of particular importance to him, because during his mission in the south, grandfather Yancey had sheltered and protected him from an angry mob who were threatening to tar and feather him and drag him out of town. Grandfather was apparently willing to face this mob at personal danger of also being tarred and feathered. Apparently grandfather had a great deal of love and respect for President Smith.

It is not to my credit that I am unable to furnish greater details in the life of this great man but I hope that there will be other sources in our family organization that will be able to put together a more complete story.

Heart Attack Claims Life Of Senator Jesse L. Yancy

BRUCE, Miss., Aug. 26. — State Senator Jesse L. Yancy Jr., one of North Mississippi's most colorful political figures, died at the Calhoun County Hospital after a heart attack at his home early Wednesday.

The 44-year-old legislator was serving his first term in the Senate but had long been active in regional politics.

In 1967, before he qualified for the District 11 Senate seat, Senator Yancy had frequently been mentioned as a possible candidate for lieutenant governor. Speculation had risen again recently that he might seek Mississippi's No. 2 post in next year's election.

Senator Yancy was chairman of the Senate Elections Committee. He helped guide the state's new "Open Election" law to passage early this year.

As a member of the Senate Commission on Appropriations he played a major role in gaining legislative approval of an act authorizing the investment of temporarily idle state funds.

Senator Yancy was also a member of the Senate committees on child welfare, highways, judiciary, temperance and universities and colleges.

Before his Senate election, he served eight years as district attorney for the Third Circuit Court District. He was acting in that capacity in November, 1962, when the Lafayette County (Oxford) Grand Jury indicted Chief United States Marshal James P. McShane on a charge of breach of the peace — inciting a riot.

This charge grew out of the violence on the University of Mississippi campus which surrounded the admission of James H. Meredith, a Negro.

Senator Yancy was graduated from the University of Mississippi Law School in 1951. He

was a former president of the Mississippi Prosecutors Association and the Bruce Rotary Club, president of the Calhoun County Bar Association and past commander of the Bruce post of the Veterans of Foreign Wars.

He was a veteran of World War II and had been attorney for the city of Bruce for 17 years.

Services will be at 3 p.m. Thursday at Bruce United Methodist Church with burial in Bruce Cemetery. Anthony Funeral Home has charge.

He leaves his wife, Mrs. Barbara Young Yancey, two sons, Lee Yancy and Tom Yancy, a daughter, Miss Cindy Yancy, his mother, Mrs. Ethel Onsbey Yancy, and a sister, Mrs. C. R. Easley Jr., all of Bruce.

Jesse Yancy Jr. Final Rites Held Thursday

Funeral services were held from the Bruce United Methodist Church last Thursday Aug. 27, at 3 p. m. for Senator Jesse Lee Yancy Jr.

Services were conducted by the Rev. Ron Williams, assisted by Lt. Gov. Charles L. Sullivan and Judge Merle Palmer of Pascagoula. The Rev. G. A. McCoy also participated. Interment followed in the Bruce Cemetery with Anthony Funeral Home in charge.

Many who attended could not be seated inside the church, as hundreds from over the state and neighboring states came to attend final rites for the 44 year old attorney and lawmaker. He died at approximately 1:1 a. m. on Aug. 26, following a heart attack.

He leaves his wife, one daughter, Cindy, and two son Lee and Tom; his mother Mrs. Ethel O. Yancy; and sister, Mrs. C. R. Easley J all of Bruce.

I cannot imagine what information I have sent to you that would be interesting to go on WEB site. You have my permission to do just that if you think it is passable.



W. L. Yancy moved from Alabama, lived on the Buck Sharp place, then moved to Allen Brown place in Calhoun/ County, He married Nancy Sharp first time and had one child Word, then married Martha Bratton and had the other children. They moved to the Sarepta community. Martha Bratton died when my mom was 10 years of age. His daughter Phronie, lived with him and took care of him. There was always a crowd over at Gramps each Sunday of neighbors or family coming in for a visit. Auntie never married but one of the sweetest persons you had ever known. Opal & I could go over for a visit and she would let us or any of the other granddaughters get into her dresses and wear them, mess up or just about anything we wanted to do so we always went to Gramps every chance we got. At the family reunions the house was full with everyone coming home at Christmas time. One Christmas all were gathered over there and Santa Claus came, red suit & all and delivered the gifts in person, this was about the greatest thing ever. I think Santa was Uncle Clarence Miz. We lived near Gramps, walking distance when I was small. At the family reunions the men always ate first, then the women, then the children. They had this long bench on one side of the table and we all wanted to eat on the bench. There was always plenty to eat at Gramps house. When Gramps was a ole man he dug this ditch east of the house and now it is a wide creek. He always walked everywhere, could hear good and see good and lived to be 96 years of age. He always drank a totty before retiring. I remember too when they got their outside toilet built with the concrete floor in it and this was about the thing, you were pretty well to do if you had that kind of out house. They also had this dinner bell outside that you rang when you wanted Gramps to come for dinner out of the field. If it was rang at any othe time it meant for people to come to their rescue because something was wrong. Auntie would blow up the hogs stomach(when they would kill hogs) and let it dry with peas in it, would make a nice play toy. Gramps & Auntie sold the place to Dwight Hellums, then lived with Uncle Jack & Aunt Jettie until their death.

Word--married May Henly, had one daughter, Myrle who married Hubert Glenn, Myrle had no children and they live in Sarepta, Mississippi --Word died with heart attack

George Tom-- m. Ila Sharpe, lived in the Potlockna community, had one child George T and he married Fay Grist the first time, had one child, Sandra Joe, then married Betty & had a boy & girl(they live in Oxford, Miss.). Tom died with Cancer, Ila died with blood clot from broken leg-- George T, died in July, 1975. He & Aunt Ila are buried at the Webb cemetery, Uncle Tom is buried in the ole part of Sarepta, cemetery.
