The Story Behind the Family Bible Preservation Project**



The Miracle of Finding the “LOST CHILDREN”

The background behind the “FAMILY BIBLE PRESERVATION PROJECT”

One evening, some months back, I awoke in the early hours of the morning, when most people were still sleeping, and felt inspired to go to my computer and check a website I periodically monitor for items of genealogical value. That morning, I stumbled upon a stunning Family Register dating back to the early 1800s. This cherished family heirloom, meticulously filled out with family names and dates by proud parents in beautiful script, seemed to me to be a testament to the deep commitment to and eternal hope of their familial bond. However, amidst its beauty, I noticed a few subtle details that added much depth to this family's story. Among the six children listed, four had tragically passed away as youngsters in the mid-1830s. Their names, would never be found on the regular census records created at every “turn of a decade”. Children like these are often referred to as "The Lost Children" by family researchers – lost to those doing family research who rely on census and other government records that would have missed these children who had been born and died between census years and before birth records were kept on a regular basis.

Remarkably, this wasn't the first instance when the “veil was made thin” and where such a beautiful and seemingly inspired family record found its way into my hands, often under extraordinary (even spiritual) circumstances, revealing evidence of infants lost to their parents at tender ages. Similar circumstances have occurred repeatedly over the past four years – in a miraculous set of events and project – known as the “Family Bible Preservation Project”.

I had often heard it said that “If you want to see miracles in your life – then get involved in genealogy”. The truth is that never had I seen this statement fulfilled more profoundly, more regularly and more concretely than I had in the what I called “**The Family Bible Preservation Project**” . . .

Members of the Family Bible Preservation Project work with treasured heirlooms like this on a regular daily basis – to date we have processed nearly 70,000 items – about 55,000 of them being family bible records. Many team members feel like they are directly involved with genealogical miracles as they work on the project. Another quite interesting fact is that some members of the team have found that they are related to 60-70% of the families corresponding to the bible records they process – **Team members quickly realize they are doing the work for their own family!**

So I guess I need to explain, just what this “Family Bible Preservation Project” really is, how it came about, and the difference it is making in changing lives on BOTH sides of the veil.

I guess I need to go back a few years . . .

In late 2018 I began to formulate in my mind, little by little, the development of a project – a project that in my mind –would be much bigger than just myself and my own personal genealogical goals. I began to form the idea of a project in my head that was much more altruistic in nature than simply me pursuing the genealogical research of my family as I had for the past 30 years before. So many genealogical researchers I had known seemed to be working in “silos” - simply focusing on their own research goals and compiling a database that they had total control over and not thinking about ways to improve the genealogical landscape across the world for all involved as well as projects that leveraged the potential of many hundred or even millions of people all working together instead of everyone working independently. I also saw how many of these people working in silos – ended up near the end of their life having amassed an extraordinary amount of information – but for which they themselves then didn’t quite know what to do with when they passed on – and the family left behind would probably simply throw all their years of research out with the trash. Over time I began to take a drastically different approach to my work in family history. Over the many decades of research on my own Yancey family line – I had come to realize just how many incredibly valuable and amazingly beautiful family records are out there – that simply go unnoticed by most of the world of researchers. I also noted how so many of those looking for the records of their ancestors – almost had a “looking for a needle in a haystack” approach to things like finding “family bibles” or other similar family heirlooms. As one example It was obvious that many thousands of family bible records existed – but it seemed that there must be millions of families that didn’t even know a family bible of their ancestors even existed for their family and where.

As stated, more and more I found that so many incredible family heirlooms and records – were flying under the radar of so many family researchers. There had to be a better way to ensure that family members could be made aware of such family heirlooms and at the same time preserve such items beyond the life of just the current generation. BUT it wasn’t going to happen if everyone just continued focusing on their own isolated research focus. It needed to be a holistic approach - and it would need to involve more than just me or a few people.

It was about this same time that the buzzword of “Crowd Sourcing” came into popular use. See [this link](#) for a good explanation of what Crowd Sourcing is. It was also a time when the platform “Just Serve” was getting a lot of exposure – which leveraged the concept of crowd sourcing.

And so little by little I began to mentally put the pieces together of what would become the “Family Bible Preservation Project” – a project by which many people all working together

could gather, upload, and link (“person tag”) thousands of family bible records and other genealogical heirlooms to the family that they once belonged to – but which so few people knew about or had gathered the valuable genealogical data from. And it would not just be limited to Family Bibles – but many family heirlooms – especially those with treasured genealogical data - images of which could be uploaded to FamilySearch and expected to still be there generation down the road.

The project did not grow quickly – the first year was a little tough – and I could have easily given up. Early on I established a Just Serve Project that people could easily find who were interested in community volunteering. One of my first supporters was an Eagle Scout who used my underlying idea to get various people involved in the project. The number of items we uploaded and tagged in FamilySearch began to grow, slowly at first, but accelerating with time.

I also advertised the project on FamilySearch Community and later on various Facebook pages. Little by little and with lots of effort the project and the number of team members began to grow and eventually thrive.

I think it took us numerous months to hit our first thousand records processed. It was a big deal to me. Today we can process about a thousand items in a month or two. We are soon to reach 60,000 items processed (Spring 2025) and we can actually see some light at the end of the tunnel (if there really is ever an end) to make us believe that we should be able to reach 100,000 items uploaded and person tagged in FamilySearch memories in the years ahead – a potential accomplishment that a few years back would have been totally incredulous.

I truly believe that the project has been influenced by those beyond the veil – people seeking work to be done that they themselves cannot do for themselves – but seeking out those still living here on earth that can act on their behalf. I believe that the Spirit of Elijah has been at the core of this project and an underlying power in its guidance and direction.

“Behold, I will send you Elijah the prophet before the great and awesome day of the LORD comes. And he will turn the hearts of fathers to their children and the hearts of children to their fathers, lest I come and strike the land with a decree of utter destruction.”

I don’t take the credit for these numbers and the results of the project. They only became possible with all the many passionate volunteers we have had working on the project together. I currently have a list I refer to of about 500 persons to date – people that showed interested in getting involved with project at one point in time. Probably about half of that are people who actually got actively involved at some point and a portion of that are currently working on the

project today. These are the people who are miracle-workers – and there have been numerous miracles – too many even to count – as the many participants can each bear witness to. (in a page that follows you can read some feedback from some of our team members). We have representation from youth all the way up to 80 or 90 year olds – some of our best team members by the way!! And we have all sorts of people with diverse talents and skills. We have people who can read Spanish, French, German, Danish, Dutch, even Chinese and Medieval Script!! We have people that can take an image that is virtually illegible and produce names and dates – as if resurrecting people! So many people have been added to FamilySearch family Tree – because of our team of miracle workers. And so much work will now be available to do by others users of Family Tree – as these new records become available to all FamilySearch Users and millions of people now using “Ordinance Ready”.

The field truly is “white and ready to harvest” and the blessing of reaping the harvest are blessings that anyone can reap and benefit from. In most ways it simply requires a willing heart. God is not a respecter of persons – the blessings he pours out from the windows of heaven are available to anyone willing to reap them – it just takes faith and action.

Who can participate in the Project?

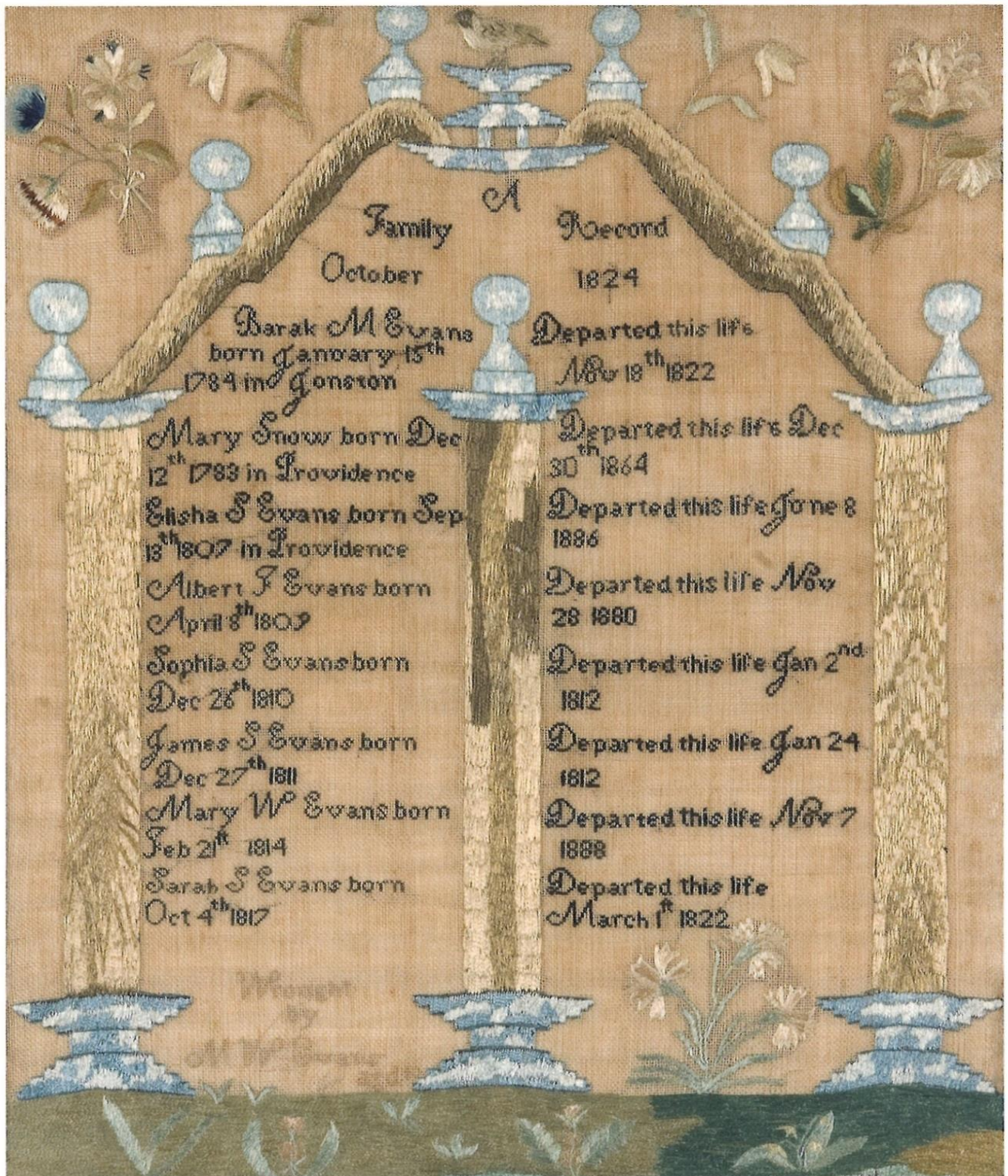
Virtually anyone. BUT existing experience using FamilySearch Memories is a huge plus avoiding what could be a large learning curve. Anyone with FamilySearch Memories experience should be able to become adept at the project tasks quite quickly.

Who would be interested?

We find that the following groups may find this project very rewarding and fulfilling: Service Missionaries, Those seeking Community Service opportunities, Single Adults, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, Relief Societies, Church groups, Genealogy Clubs, those seeking Internship opportunities, Community Volunteers, those with experience in genealogy and family history, Disabled or Home Bound, Computer aficionados and many more.

What does it require?

Not too much more than a love for serving others both living and deceased – and access to a computer and Internet and a passion for family history and service. People work at their own home on their own schedule and at their own pace. No strings attached and no formal commitment.

I have been actively involved in family history since I was a young teenager – even before the days of computers, email, the Internet and sites like FamilySearch and Ancestry. And I grew up on a farm near a very small community – and far from any big city library. My early years of genealogical research were done by correspondence – and with rare visits to the Family History Library in Salt Lake as well as pouring through family histories I had inherited from parents and grandparents and others.

When I first started gathering genealogical records as a teenager – most of what I compiled came from a small number of source types (keeping in mind this was before the Internet). Many of my ancestors had compiled family histories, life stories, and family record albums. I inherited much of this priceless information from my parents, grandparents and others. At a young age I also started corresponding with other very distant members of the Yancey family as I began to research my Yancey line that had never been traced out of the United States. One source of contacts – were names from the “Who’s who” volumes in the local school library and I would write some of these more noteworthy members of the family vis US Mail – before email came into common use. Occasionally I would have a “field trip” to the Salt Lake Family History Center but that luxury wasn’t too often. As the months and years went by I had accumulated quite a bit of family information from these mainly family sources.

It is quite interesting, however, to note how the invention of computers, the Internet, and websites and applications like FamilySearch.org or Ancestry.com and their massive genealogical databases came to change and cause to evolve the information that people collected as family researchers. Before the Internet – most of my records were “family centric” - documents created and maintained by the family itself – example include first hand life histories, family bible records, journals and diaries, family albums, family letters, and other important family documents.

When the Internet came around with sites like FamilySearch and Ancestry – there was an explosion in what was now available from databases that contained such things as census records, marriage records, death records and similar items. This was nothing less than a miracle in so many ways . . . BUT what many people didn’t consciously perceive at the time – was that there came to be a big paradigm shift from FAMILY-centric documents to more EVENT centric documents. (the event of a census year, or the event of a marriage). Such “event centric” documents – often lacked the “big picture” of the family “as a whole” and only gave a snapshot of certain family members at a certain point in time. A census record for example – didn’t include, obviously, information on yet to be born children – NOR did it include information on those who died as infants before the census was taken.

After many years of millions of people doing research in the years of the Internet – it was not uncommon at all – to find people who had accumulated large files of information - but where very little FAMILY centric documents had been used – and only EVENT specific documents that in the end did not give a full perspective of the family that other types of documents would have. These researchers often had huge holes in their collection of family information –

because such information had not come from the family itself – but other event based sources where it was quite possible information about certain members of the family or certain aspects of the family may have been totally left out.

To somewhat compensate for this lack of more complete family generated documents FamilySearch early on came out with “FAMILYSEARCH Memories” to allow millions of its users to upload images and transcripts of family documents to the FamilySearch application and link them directly to the families and people they corresponded/belonged to. This was a huge success – and millions of people began to upload family photos, letters, life histories and the like. Today there are many millions of items uploaded to FS Memories and the number keeps growing at a rate that is mind boggling.

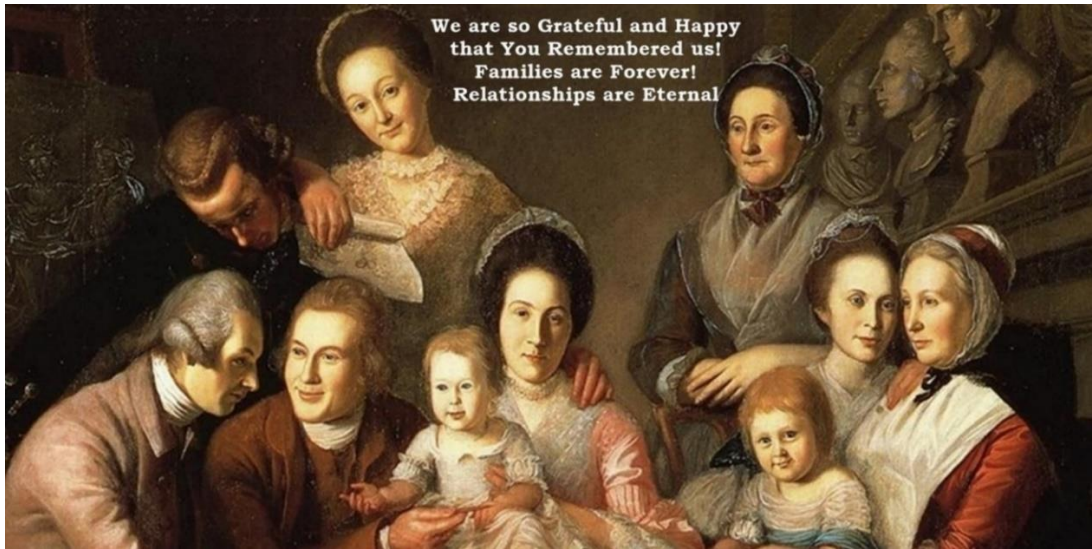
Unfortunately, there are many family documents and treasured heirlooms that were once among family members – but now are out of the hands of family – and may only exist now as items/objects in Museums, Historical Associations, Genealogical Societies, and even with antique collectors, and auction houses or even on Facebook pages and for sale on sites like Ebay or CraigsList.

One of the major goals of the Family Bible Preservation Project is to reunite many of these family centric documents with the original family they once belonged to (descendants of the family actually) using the miracle of FamilySearch Memories.

To date more than 55,000 Family Bibles have been uploaded and person tagged in FamilySearch Memories (October 2024). But the project does not limit itself to just family bibles. They also process similar artifacts such as family registers, needlework samplers (often containing genealogical data), fraktur documents, antique funeral cards and funeral programs, family portraits, and even biographies and narratives including first hand narratives from individuals born during the era of slavery (known as “slave narratives”).

The vast majority of family members connected with many of these items – didn’t even know they existed before they were uploaded to FamilySearch Memories. In uploading the item – descendants of such persons are often notified by FamilySearch when an item is uploaded concerning their ancestor. This revelation frequently elicits astonishment and gratitude from descendants who had no prior knowledge of these artifacts.

With over 70,000 items having been uploaded and that number continuing to expand the impact of this project is snowballing. Just the number of names that are contained in such documents could eventually number in the hundreds of thousands. And then if you think of all the living descendants of such people that may exist the number would almost certainly be in the millions. The project will surely have a domino effect for many decades to come as these descendants benefit from the records being processed in FamilySearch Memories.

The Family Bible Preservation Project reached a milestone goal of processing 50,000 “family bible related Memories items” in the Spring of 2024.

50,000 is a bit hard to conceptualize. Here are a few points to help put in perspective what will have been accomplished.

- If 50,000 bibles were placed on top of each other – with an average width of 3 inches per bible – it would result in a stack of bible over 12,500 feet high. That would be nearly the sum of the height of TEN Empire State Buildings.
- If each bible had a family register with over 10 family names recorded all together it would include information on over ½ million people. Most Family bibles have more than 10 names. If the number was 100 people per bible the sum would be 5 million person/names.
- If you were to pick a family bible from the mid 1700’s – there could easily potentially be millions of currently living descendants of the original family whose data is recorded in the bible - - i.e. millions of people potentially could be interested in the family record of just one bible.
- FamilySearch has millions of users. Along with the facts of the previous bullet – It is highly likely that there are hundreds of thousands of FamilySearch users or even millions of POTENTIAL users who could be interested in a bible the project has processed corresponding to one of their ancestors.
- A large percentage of family bibles have at least some amount of family genealogical data that is not / was not yet in FamilySearch Family Tree before it was uploaded. There is a huge domino effect in relation to the amount of data that has already been added as well as data that will be added to FamilySearch Family Tree – based on the family registers in these uploaded family bible records. In turn this will generate over time a large amount of family history work for those families that have had additional info / additional names added to FamilySearch. Even if specific people are not aware of the bible record per se – they could still be involved in the Family History work for these family members simply by using the “Ordinance Ready” option in FamilySearch.
- In the next 4 years there is the real possibility we could reach 100,000 items processed. That more than doubles everything that was previously discussed.

Some Feedback from some of the project team members

JS:

"I just want to let you know that this has been the most challenging, yet rewarding project I have ever worked on. I love the "hunt" in family search and have honed some pretty good skills, but this tests all my skills! It feels like the spirits on the other side are cheering me on, helping to find them and their families through this project. On one family, I added 5 babies that had died as infants through the bible entries. The gaps were obvious in the family tree. These may be the only records to source these kinds of family add-ons. The most challenging are the Civil War amputee photos, but thanks to Ancestry.com I can at least have some hope to find these boys. When I find the person, or create a family to match the record, it's a gift to their descendants and me. To have a face on their profile is an amazing experience. thanks for this."

WS:

I love doing this project more each day! I do feel the spirit of those for whom I'm researching. It gives me joy to tag the names of each person and know they appreciate my efforts. It opens the gate for some of them. It gives me joy for those who are researching their family and might have hit a brick wall and now here is a wealth of information! I feel my work might be an answer to someone's prayer... I felt that today as I worked. There was one instance in which I sensed the family was so excited and I felt "finally!" While discerning the correct people to attach, (and we know there are so many people with the same name), most times I feel guided and am able to know which one is the exact, correct person. What a joy this is. I am adding an additional tag to some in the "Custom Event" place that gives the researcher a heads-up that there is more information about their family in Memories. Especially the ones where the Bible record indicates there is an additional child that is not included on the current family list, or there are many missing dates that are provided in the Bible record. Also, some families will have a lot of info in Memories and wouldn't be aware that something new has been added so they won't be looking, but the tag I leave is another heads-up for more information. When I see how much work still needs to be done in some of these families I sense the urgency to make sure as much information as possible is available, and hope it will spark a desire to see more, and that they will pursue their research. I am spreading the word about this wonderful project that I am so privileged to participate in.

DH:

"I enjoyed reading the comments other volunteers made about how they felt inspired many times. I have felt this also, very frequently and I guess I thought I was the only one! Also, the comment about "going down the rabbit hole" really hit home with me. If I can tell that no one has looked at the family in a while and there are multiple hints from FS, then I'm afraid you may as well rename me "Alice" because I jump through that rabbit hole frequently. Last week was a banner week for me in some ways. I found at least 10 children who were listed in the Bible that were born and died between censuses. I, of course, added them in, these "lost children". Such a warm feeling that really makes my day."

TA:

I really feel God's help while I work on them. I think my German ancestors must be helping too!!

KP:

[in ref to the McLeod/Crosland family bible]. Little did the volunteers at the Columbia FamilySearch Center know the breadth of benefit their act of adding this transcript to a database would be [that the bible project has processed].

Thirty-three from this family now have the memory attached to them in FamilySearch where some relatives might discover it and have it be an aid to their research.

I am related to six branches of this family. When I pick through all the limbs and twigs of these families, I will probably find a multitude of people that need ordinances. Then there are the people from all over the United States and some foreign countries who will go to temples and give their service as proxies for these ordinances and thus be blessed.

And this is the harvest from only one of the transcripts added by volunteers in the Columbia FamilySearch Center. There are a bunch more to process.

This is another testimony of the value of the Family Bible Preservation Project. Thank you, Dennis, for listening to the prompting to develop this project. It has blessed me as well!

BB:

My first experience with the Family Bible Preservation Project was on the receiving end. I had been working on a brick wall in relation to deceased family members for whom I could find very little information. Then, lo and behold, a bible was attached to this couple in FamilySearch. I was able to find not only the maiden name of my 5th great grandmother, but the existence of a first marriage. But what really touched my heart was the information for four children born to this couple that had no record to be found outside of this bible.

I have a brother that died when I was a teenager and he, being only one month old. So I immediately added these infant/toddlers to FamilySearch. I sought out the origin of the posting of this bible and have been volunteering with the Family Bible Preservation Project ever since. I am guided from the other side as I work on these relics that connect us to our families. If I start with prayer there are very few times I cannot make the connection to the person to whom this information belongs. It has been a blessing to me, as my health does not allow me to do much outside of the home and it gives me a great feeling of purpose. More than once I have felt the sweet presence of my baby brother, who left this mortality to serve a greater mission on the other side.

Our ancestors are there, so much closer than we know, to help where they can. It amazes me the things we can accomplish when we allow Heavenly Father to use us to bless others.

BR:

I love the challenge to find a person in Family Search but it is an even greater feeling knowing we are linking or uniting families. The feeling of adding a "lost family member" is indescribable. I imagine numerous people jumping for joy and weeping in humble gratitude when they are added in Family Search. I have been able to perform ordinances for hundreds of members in my family tree because of this project.

Some of the advantages of the Family Bible Preservation Project over other similar projects (such as traditional “FamilySearch Indexing”)

- 1) People often find it more fulfilling, less stressful and more enjoyable than other more traditional projects. The project is much less "mind numbing" than some of the other much more tedious and repetitive indexing projects of the past. In this project people get hooked on "solving the puzzle" of how the record they are processing fits into FamilySearch Family Tree and people enjoy solving puzzles.
- 2) The main intent of the project is to link items directly to people and their profile records in FamilySearch Family Tree (or adding them if they don't exist). Its more than just indexing - its ensuring that the family record is reunited with the family it belongs to in Family Tree.
- 3) The time between a record being part of FamilySearch -and such a record being linked to the family it belongs to - is drastically reduced. (FamilySearch has BILLIONS of documents/images in its database - but a small percentage yet - are linked to the people they correspond to. In this project the items are linked to the families almost from the get-go.
- 4) Fellow users of FamilySearch who are related to the family associated to the item being processed - are often made aware of these family treasures of genealogical information (through FamilySearch communications). Many of them were never aware of such treasured records. People love seeing the visual images of these family treasures.
- 5) People doing the person tagging often find that they are distantly related to the people associated with the items being processed. People see they are doing the work for their own family. This can make the project so much more inspirational.
- 6) Often in Family Bibles, sampler, registers - is evidence of children who died during infancy - and in many cases have all but been forgotten and have not been included in FamilyTree . As part of the project these forgotten children are being reunited with their families.
- 7) As newly identified family members are added to FamilySearch Family Tree - people searching for opportunities for family history / temple work will very easily be made aware of these research/temple opportunities (potentially millions of users of FamilySearch)
- 8) Even people who are part of the project team may find themselves adding some names to FamilyTree that were not in the system until that point - and then may take the subsequent step of adding them into their temple ready files.
- 9) Many Members of the project team feel that they are more likely to feel the "Spirit of Elijah" in this project - than in various others.
- 10) The types of records processed by our team - are often one of a kind records with family information not often found elsewhere - that in many cases would never have been processed by a formal FamilySearch indexing project. Also - in most cases such items are in the "public domain" and copyright challenges don't exist.
- 11) Yet - There seems to be an almost endless supply of Family Bible records, family registers, fraktur documents, samplers and more - that should keep us busy for various years ahead - even though we have already processed nearly 50,000 bible related items (spring 2024) - potentially connected to hundreds of thousands (eventually millions of people).
- 12) The project team doesn't have to normally deal with PHYSICAL volumes (actual physical family bibles) which could take up an enormous space. All of our items are digital copies that a few key people have uploaded to FS Memories - all other team members do not have to worry about uploading and downloading.
- 13) People from anywhere in the world can work on the project - at their own schedule and pace - no strings attached.
