Declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the Act of Congress
of the 7th of June 1832.

On this 15th day of August 1832 James M. ¹⁸³² appeared before the County Court of Granville
County, Ohio, John Adams, a resident of the County State of Ohio, aged
22 years, who being lawfully sworn, according to law, doth, on his
oath, make the following declaration, in order to obtain the benefit
of the provisions made by the Act of Congress of the 7th
1832. That he resided in Guilford, Va very near the south
Carolina line. That about the time he became liable to do duty
in the Army in 1780 or thereabouts in 1789 in the place of William Parker
of Granville County, N. Carolina who had been drafted
for the term of 3 months, that he served out this term under
Capt. Peter Bennett, & was engaged principally in fishing
for the Army in Roanoke River Va immediately after
this term of service expired Applicant substituted in the
place of Joseph Stovall for the term of 3 months, who had
been drafted from Granville County, N. Carolina and
was attached to Capt. Bennett's Company, during which
time Applicant marched with said Company which
was attached to the 5th Regiment of the North Carolina
Line, Commanded by Col. Moore & Ramsey, Major
Rawl to Camden in South Carolina and was
in the Battle at that place after which Applicant
was regularly discharged by Capt. Bennett in
Franklin County. So soon as Applicant substituted for 3 months
in the place of James Stott who had been drafted in
Granville, & was attached to Capt. Bennett's company, which
company Applicant believes was attached to the 9th
Regiment of the N. Carolina Line, Commanded
by Col. Wm. Moore Major Elijah Moore, during this term
of service the above Regiment was continued in
the State of North Carolina passing from one place
to another, but was not in an engagement at the
expiration of the term Applicant was regularly dis-
charged by Capt. Bennett in Granville County. Imme-
diately after which he substituted for 3 months in the
place of A. B. Mayfield, who had been drafted in

Gravill, & was attached to Capt's company, whose
name is not now recollected, & was attached to a North Car-
olina Regiment, No. not recollected, commanded by Col
Farmer of Hillsborough, during this term remained in
North Carolina marching from point to point in
search of Tories & British - at the expiration of which
term Applicant was regularly discharged in Greenville.
So soon as Applicant was discharged he took the
place of Hugh Snellon for 3 months, who had been disch-
arged and was attached to Capt. Harris's Company, the No.
of the Regiment not recollected, but was commanded
by Col. Joseph Taylor of Greenville - marched on to-
wards Wilmington but before reached there the Regi-
ment received orders to return home - Applicant
was discharged - After this, Applicant went to Hillsbor-
ough where lay the State Troops of North Carolina
there he substituted in the place of John Spenser of
Bute County N. Carolina, who belonged to the Caval-
ry, to serve out his term of service which was upwards
of 6 months, his Company was commanded by Capt.
George Tompkins the Regiment was commanded by
Majr. Bennett Craighton, during which time we were
engaged after Tories in different parts of North Car-
olina, after about 3 months Majr. Craighton returned
home, then Majr. ~~Joseph~~ Lewis who died near by
Nashville, took the command - during this term
which continued until the close of the War, we
apprehended a great many Tories, some of which
we hung - to wit, Edwards, Gled & Housner
to our Pole at Corner Dwards on Deep River - we
also hung Reidwell who was called Sam-
ming's Dragoon - Applicant was regular-
ly discharged at Hillsborough by Governor
Morton. Applicant has lost all of his discharge
he served in all of the above Terms between 21st &
24 months - he cannot make any other proof
of his services as he believes in consequence

of the death or a want of knowledge of the residence of the persons, who were necessary to his performing the service except the evidence which is here to attached. Applicant has no documentary evidence by which he can establish his claim.

He hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a pension or annuity except the present, and declares that his name is not on the Pension Roll of the United States. Sworn and subscribed, the day & year aforesaid.

 the Companies commanded by Captain Peter Demach, — Harris & George Sergeant
 in the Regiments commanded by Col. Moore, Col. Nemacy & by Major Broad
 Captain & Major Fred Smith in the service of the United States; and that his
 name was placed on the pension roll of the State of Tennessee from whence he
 has lately removed, that he now resides in the State of Illinois where he intends to
 remain and wishes his pension to be thus payable in future. The following are
 his reasons for removing from the State of Tennessee to the State of Illinois viz:

The only child he has living resides in Perry County State of Illinois, and through
 the solicitations of himself and husband and a desire to spend the short rem-
 nant of his life in the neighborhood of said child in order that he might enjoy
 her company and receive her assistance in case of need was his only reason
 for removing from Tennessee to Illinois

On this 4th day of July 1844 personally appeared before
the Probate Justice Court for the County aforesaid
in open Court. Isaac Carmack, a resident of said
County of Perry, and known to me to be a person of good
repute and a credible witness - and being first duly
sworn according to law doth on his oath make the
following declaration in order to obtain for the daughter
of John and Sarah Susannah Baynes (or Banes)
the benefit of the provision made by the act of
Congress passed on the 7th July 1838 entitled an act
granting half pay and pensions to certain Widows

That he is the Son-in-law of the said John and
Susannah, that he first became acquainted with them
about twenty six years ago, that he has reason to
believe they were married together as long ago as the
year 1782 - he further states that the said John
Baynes (or Banes) was a pensioner of the United
States at the rate of seventy dollars a year
that his pension was allowed to him in the state
of Tennessee and that he was transferred to
this state of Illinois, and that he died on the
2nd day of September 1840 - and that Susannah his
Widow remained a Widow until the 23rd day of
April 1842 (or thereabouts) ^{on which day he died} and that she left
one and only one child living, whose name
is Sarah Carmack, the wife of this declarant
he further states that there is no record evidence
in existence to his knowledge to prove the
marriage of said Baynes and wife, that in
an old prayer book now here present, the births
of their only two children are registered, which show
that their Son Elsworth was born in 1783, and Sarah
their Daughter was born in 1786, which he believes to
be a correct register of their births

Be it known that on the 4th day of July 1844 personally
appeared before me Humphrey B. Jones, Probate Justice
of the peace in and for the County aforesaid Sarah
Warrnack who I certify to be a credible witness, and
made oath that she is the daughter and only living
child of John and Susannah Baynes. That she has reason
to believe that her parents were lawfully joined in
marriage in Mackinburg County Virginia in the
year 1782. That she deponent was born the 7th of February
1786. and that she had one Brother born the 27th of September
1783 agreeably to a register which is in her Father's
handwriting in an old prayer book now here present
which was in the possession of her parents ever
since her earliest recollection

She further states that John Baynes her Father
was in his life time a pensioner of the United
States at the rate of \$70 per annum. that he died
on the 2nd day of September 1840. and that Susannah her
Mother remained a Widow until the 23rd day of
April 1842. at which time she departed this
life. leaving no children living but herself
that her only Brother died about 30 years ago
